Health Officer

2013 has again been a busy year for the Health Department. One additional employee in both the Health Education and Environmental Divisions has increased our ability to serve the public. Requests for Health Education presentations have increased almost exponentially. Our budget for 2014 was passed as presented and includes funding for a part-time grant writer, which should also improve our capacity to serve.

We have seen a transition in nursing leadership with a new Director of Nursing and Assistant Director, as well as several new nursing staff. Overall immunizations were down some this year; however, we saw a significant increase in school influenza immunizations. We also saw a significant increase in active TB cases to be managed. Our in-detail study of groundwater problems was released and our environmental staff is now working with other local agencies to create a long range Groundwater Plan for St. Joseph County. Our food permits continue to increase with more inspections for our staff, and we have received good press coverage of our efforts with problem food establishments. Our Preparedness Division continues to work with our local emergency agencies and update Preparedness Plans that were significantly outdated. Working with the Prosecutor's office we helped reestablish our local Child Fatality Review Team.

Financial

During FY2013, the Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH) eliminated the STD Grant that the Health Department had been awarded for many years in the past. In addition, the Health Department elected not to re-apply for the Bioterrorism/Emergency Preparedness Grant for the 2013/2014 period due to the strict guidelines issued with the grant. On the other hand, the Health Department received \$50,000 from ISDH for the Influenza Immunization Grant for the second year in a row. In regards to revenue, the Health Department saw a slight decrease in fee revenue, which, when compared to 2012, was down by approximately 0.25%. However, the Health Department saw a significant increase in tax support, which was approximately 82.50% more than in 2012.

Epidemiology & Emergency Preparedness

The Epidemiology & Emergency Preparedness Division is responsible for:

- Communicable disease investigation and surveillance
- Medical countermeasure dispensing planning
- Coordination of Emergency Support Function #8
- Emergency preparedness collaboration with other response agencies
- Emergency preparedness training and education

The Epidemiology & Emergency Preparedness Division provided support to other Divisions within the Health Department in the investigation and surveillance of communicable disease or public health threats. The Supervisor also compiled data on fetal, infant, and child mortality for the St. Joseph County Child Fatality Review Team.

The Division's top responsibility of 2013 was to create an All-Hazard Medical Countermeasure Dispensing Plan to replace the Mass Prophylaxis Plan. A new Point of Dispensing Site was added to the Health Department's plans, and the Emergency Response Vehicle received several updates and new equipment that made it more functional. The Division also conducted bi-monthly meetings of the Emergency Support Function #8 and updated the corresponding annex in the county's Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan.

The Division continued to collaborate with other organizations, providing representation on the Michiana Perinatal Consortium, the Child Fatality Review Team, the Penn-Harris-Madison District Safe Schools Committee, the Indiana State Department of Health's Public Health Emergency Preparedness Cooperative Agreement Committee, the District 2 Citizen Corp Council, the District 2 Healthcare Coalition, and numerous trainings and meetings with community preparedness partners.

Division goals for 2014 include facilitating a functional exercise for Emergency Support Function #8 partners, adding more Point of Dispensing Sites (particularly closed sites) to the current plans, developing plans for a Volunteer Reception Center, and enhancing the Medical Reserve Corps.

Environmental Health

The Environmental Health Division implements the following programs to reduce the release of pathogens into the environment where they may expose the public. Most programs are regulatory driven.

- Septic System Permitting and Inspection Program
- Subdivision Planning and Review Program
- Wellhead Protection Permitting and Inspection Program
- Well Drilling and Water Supply Permitting Program

Accomplishments in 2013

Staffing

Three new staff members were hired this year. This is approximately 25% of the total Division staffing.

Drinking Water Protection Plan

The County is preparing a Drinking Water Protection Plan to assess the impact of septic systems on drinking water quality and develop alternatives for reducing that impact. The project is being guided by a Technical Working Group consisting of scientists, engineers, land use planners, industry representatives, and public officials. The first phase of the project was to have an independent assessment of drinking water quality by an environmental contractor. That phase was completed this year. The assessment showed the high nitrates in the drinking water were from septic systems and also showed that pharmaceutical products are present in the drinking water. The second phase is to collect information and cost estimates on various alternatives to reduce the impact on the drinking water. This phase began this year.

Cluster Septic System Replacement Funds

The County septic code was revised to require homeowners associations to collect and maintain funds for the eventual replacement of their cluster systems. The amount of the monthly fee charged to users was established by the Health Department and range from \$25 to \$35 per month per resident and \$5 to \$6 per month per vacant lot.

Illegal Construction Demolition Landfill

The St. Joseph County Circuit Court issued a permanent injunction prohibiting any additional material being taken to a 15 acre unpermitted landfill dump in response to a complaint filed by the Health Department and the Indiana Department of Environmental Management. The court also ordered that an environmental restrictive covenant be attached to the title of the property ending a long-standing violation.

Lead Based Paint Hazard Control

The Division participated in 26 health fairs and other public events to test children for lead and provide information about preventing lead poisoning to parents. 149 children were tested at these events, which exceeded all outreach requirements of the three year grant.

Food Services

To accomplish the mission of the St. Joseph County Health Department, the Food Division inspects nearly 1,300 Retail Food Establishments that operate in St. Joseph County. The inspections are conducted to ensure the establishments are following safe food handling practices and in full compliance with all state and local food sanitation requirements. An establishment's menu type determines the number of inspections an establishment will receive during the year.

The Food Division is also responsible for:

- All food related complaint investigations.
- Investigation of food recalls.
- Reviewing of plans (by the Food Service Director/Assistant Food Service Director) submitted by owners/operators who are building a new establishment or conducting extensive remodeling of an existing establishment.
- Facilitation of the St. Joseph County Food Protection Committee meetings.
- Publishing a Spring/Summer and Fall/Winter newsletter.
- Conducting opening inspections on new establishments and establishments that change their name or have a change in ownership.
- Performing inspections on food vendors who are at temporary events.

<u>Highlighted Programs/Projects/Events in 2013</u>

St. Joseph County Health Improvement Alliance

As a result of the National Public Health Performance Standards Project in 2011, a small working group consisting of individuals within the local public health system (LPHS) continued with strategically creating a county-wide health improvement alliance. In November of 2013, more than 40 different public health partners began work collaboratively on major health issues, system infrastructure, and partner communication.

Reducing Obesity Coalition of St. Joseph County (ROC)

In partnership with several ROC members, the "Family Passport to Play" program was designed and implemented. This program offers free events every month in City and County parks allowing family members to participate in activities they may not have originally thought to participate in or could not participate in due to cost. South Bend Mayor Pete Buttigieg and South Bend Police Chief Ron Teachman helped local primary centers kick-off walking school buses, which allowed children to walk to school. Several primary centers have been working on developing individual walking school bus plans to have them be a regular part of the school day. The Director of Health Education worked very closely with the United Way of St. Joseph County on a multi-level, multi-year collective impact obesity project. In the fall of 2013 the Director of Health Education began working closely with the City of South Bend and Mayor Buttigieg to lay the ground work to declare South Bend a "Let's Move City" following Michelle Obama's national initiative to fight childhood obesity. Mayor Buttigieg will declare South Bend a "Let's Move City" early in 2014.

Nursing

The Nursing Division includes the Public Health Nursing Division, the Sexually Transmitted Disease and HIV Clinics Division, the Immunization Clinics, Tuberculosis case management, and Medical Records. The Nursing Division is committed to community and public health nursing. They are advocates for providing access to care to the citizens of St. Joseph County. Nursing staff function in multiple roles within the Health Department and continue to expand their knowledge and skills.
